Mr. Meyer is responsible for global area, yield, and productions estimates as well as advanced feedstocks analytics for S&P Global Commodity Insights, which includes North America, South America, Europe, and the Black Sea region in conjunction with other London and Gdansk-based analysts. Ian Thomson, President, Advanced Biofuels Canada



Ian Thomson is the President of Advanced Biofuels Canada (ABFC), the national voice for advanced biofuels in Canada. ABFC members represent the Canadian market interests of 45 US ethanol plants and, across all members, represents companies with over 36 billion litres (6,600 MG) of global biofuel production capacity.

Since 2005, Ian has played a key role in the development of Canada's biofuels sector. He has worked directly on all key federal/provincial energy and climate action policies in Canada, including renewable and low carbon fuel regulations, carbon pricing, fuel quality standards, and fiscal policies to build biofuel production capacity

and expand clean fuel use. The firm he co-founded in 2005 worked with Archer Daniel Midlands to commission one of Canada's largest biofuel refineries in Lloydminster, Alberta in 2013.

Ian co-founded Waterfall Advisors Group, a biofuels consulting firm, which provides expert strategy, market development, and compliance services to Canada's clean fuels markets; this work includes supporting USGC's market development efforts. Ian's professional career has exemplified the value of collaboration; Waterfall's work with USGC is helping demonstrate to Canadian governments how higher ethanol blends are key to achieving ambitious 2030 climate targets and net-zero emissions by 2050 in non-ZEV transportation.
